

OUR RIGHT TO FREEDOM - AUSTRALIA 2016 - (Media release)

The last thing I thought about when I was a kid, driving up and down the east coast of Australia looking for waves, was my right to be free. I was free... I felt free. But, over time the system starts kicking the crap out of you and, you realise that your not so free after all... That taste of freedom is something worth fighting for so here's my head butt back to the system. Human rights are about freedom. They are your rights and, for future reference, it's worth planting this information in the back of your head.

Australia is a member state to the United Nations and signatory to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) and yet, our governments are in direct violation of many of those rights. These are Human Rights written into international law and some of those violations, against all of us, include:-

UDHR - Article 3 & Article 12: Outlines our rights to privacy and bodily integrity. In UK and USA law police need a reason to suspect that a driver is intoxicated, before requesting a breath and/or sobriety test. This also applies to drug testing - They can't do anything without good reason. i.e. (Due cause). Not so in Australia where they can pull you out of the crowd and violate your right to privacy and bodily integrity. These violations include random breath testing, random cannabis swabbing and drug sniffer dogs. This doesn't happen in countries who respect human rights.

UDHR - Article 20 (1): Freedom of peaceful assembly. "Anti protest laws" are a violation of this Article. There's a \$5,500 fine and up to 7 years in prison if you take a stand against say, logging protected wilderness areas or fracking coal seams under your property. Also, the laws will trap everybody who wants to take a stand against something that's manifestly wrong going on in our country. That includes protesting violations to your human rights...

UDHR - Article 19: Freedom of press. The ASIO Act 2014 provides for 5 years in prison and takes away your right to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers. Also, the Discrimination Act blocks free speech on a number of levels. (You can't call a spade a spade). The next step is government run media where we can only think, print and say what the government tells us. Goodvibes would shit in his grave.

UDHR - Article 20 (1): Freedom of association. "Anti association laws" make it illegal to talk to or associate with anyone from a declared organisation. That would be a bikie gang or any gang the government chooses - So, don't talk to anyone with a tat or a badge or you could end up being criminalised and then no one will be aloud to associate with you, or talk to you - ever.

UDHR - Article 5 & Article 7: Equal protection of the law. The Migration Amendment Bill allows authorised officers to act outside the laws and removes the power of the courts to hold those responsible to account - In other words they can kick the crap out of a refugee, even the ones they've already put in hospital, and get away with it. Get your jack boots now and avoid the rush.

UDHR - Article 13 (1) & Article 3: Freedom of movement and right to liberty, the right to be free. Lock out laws takes away our right to freedom of movement and our right to be free within society. This resulted in keep our cities open protests. If you shut down the clubs and pubs you shut down the cities and take away our freedom to do what we want when we want to do it.

The UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights is a declaration of FREEDOM and states basic rights and fundamental freedoms to which all human beings are entitled. No nation may rightfully deprive a person of a human right. Human rights are fundamental rights universal to all human beings and are considered to be the necessities of human existence. They are internationally recognised personal guarantees and freedoms that the Government cannot abridge, either by law or by judicial interpretation.

So what's going on in Australia - Are we a free nation or do we live in a penal colony? Australia should be seen as the country who leads the world in human rights issues and yet here we are totally oppressed by the ignorance and arrogance of a few public servants. Public servants obsessed with money, power and control at the expence of the freedoms of an entire nation.

If your young and half wild, sooner or latter your going to get busted for something. If that something violates your human rights, either directly or indirectly, then it's probably going to be your best defence. Use it... Fighting for those rights is a fight for your freedom.
